Mayor Richard Kempthorne confirmed the decision has been made to allow the state of emergency to expire. A notice of transition to recovery has been issued. The huge effort from all agencies involved to ensure the threat to people, animals and property is alleviated this is acknowledged.

Fire and Emergency New Zealand

Fire and Emergency Area Manager Grant Haywood is asking residents to remain vigilant, and to stop and think about the risk of fire before any outdoor activities.

Before undertaking any outdoor activity consider the urgency of the work and potential that it could create a spark, for example, where metal could strike metal or stone, such as mowing grass, using firearms or grinding, welding or metal cutting. If these activities can't wait until there's been considerable rain, we're asking they are timed for early in the morning with calm, cool temperatures.

A new fire that started this afternoon in the Redwood Valley area, north-east of the existing Pigeon Valley fire ground, has slowed and been stopped at the grass at the foot of the gully where the fire began.

Winds and low humidity today meant conditions for fire risk were heightened, resulting in challenging fire conditions.

Crews are confident that fire is slowing and they have been able to gain a decent foothold in fighting it. A combination of the ability to move crews and resources quickly from Pigeon Valley fire and the downhill direction of the initial blaze have been the determining factor in the current containment of the fire.

Winds and low humidity today meant conditions for fire risk were heightened, resulting in challenging fire conditions.

If you feel unsafe or threatened, it is sensible to self-evacuate as a precaution. Anyone who self-evacuates should register with the Welfare Centre at New Life Church, 85 Wensley Road, Richmond.

Fire and Emergency NZ has received a lot of calls from the public about the fire and we thank the public for their vigilance and staying alert in these conditions.
